Burn aftercare is woefully lacking with little ongoing aftercare support for the burned child and burn prevention education is key.



Our achievements over the past 9 years

- Purchase of new dermatome for grafting surgeries
- 2 mil Rand state-of-the-art laser to improve burn scars
- X-box and TV for making physiotherapy fun and therefore less painful
- Flat screen TV to show children's movies dressing distraction
- Sport equipment for gym / physiotherapy / play room equipment
- Baby push chairs and wheel chairs to take children outside in fresh air
- Birthday parties and gifts in the ward for all children with major burns
- Furnishing of counselling room and parent's rest/quiet area
- Providing Sun hats for all children with facial burns to avoid sun-related hyperpigmentation over the scars.
- Supplying all mothers with a toiletry bag as many arrive destitute from their burned out shacks and can stay for many months.




Outcomes: Fire department statistics 2019

- 1.4% drop in informal settlment fires
- 5.5% drop in formal house fires
- 29% reduction in fatalities

(City of Cape Town Media Release 28 August 2019)

Teaching in township schools

Lessons learnt:

- Working with community for acceptance, access.
- Using adult burn survivors as trainers.
- Train the teachers too.
- Revisit schools every 2 years to enforce message.




Prevention drive 2019-20

- Over 30,000 primary school children have been trained in burn prevention to date.
- High schools have now also requested training
- Hospital admissions and number of surgeries needed are lower than ever, despite population growth in the under 14 year age group of the Western Cape
- 2020 expansion to other regions in SA through Burn Ambassador training

- To build on the important exchanges with the European Burn Association and develop ongoing working relationships.




